A Ngā Karahipi Uru Rākau (Forestry Scholarship) is your first step to a career in one of New Zealand's largest and innovative industries.

Te Uru Rākau — New Zealand Forest Service, is committed to creating greater diversity across forestry and wood-processing. In particular, we encourage Māori and those who identify as female to take up careers in forestry and help transform New Zealand's future.

Who can apply?

We want to hear from applicants who are Māori and/or identify as female, or both, enrolling in the Diploma in Forest Management at Toi Ohomai Institute of Technology (must be a New Zealand citizen or permanent resident).

What you'll receive

Tāu ka whiwhi ai

Recipients will receive \$7000 for each year of their two-year diploma (subject to successful completion of each academic year).

The scholarship also includes a paid internship over summer of 10 weeks with Te Uru Rākau — New Zealand Forest Service, or an employer in the forestry sector.

Forestry is so broad. You can go into basically anything. For instance, there is engineering, environmental, harvest planning, biology, business, just to name a few!
